# ATTORNEY BILL BOLGRIEN

## HOSPITAL LEGAL COUNSEL

1964 - PRESENT

As a Beloit City Councilor in 1964, Attorney William Bolgrien was privy to the first discussions about the challenges facing the hospital on Olympian Boulevard.

“We needed an overhaul because we had a lot of new equipment that we needed to purchase. We were getting bids and some of the equipment costs were half the value of the hospital. That’s when it started. People got together and formed an organization named *On the Move*.”

*On the Move* was a non-profit group that began to organize the effort for a new hospital.

“It was all tied to the fact that we could rebuild the hospital with contributions and some federal assistance such as Hill-Burton Funds.”

The Hospital Survey and Construction Act (i.e. Hill-Burton Act) passed in 1946 giving hospitals, nursing homes and other health facilities grants and loans for

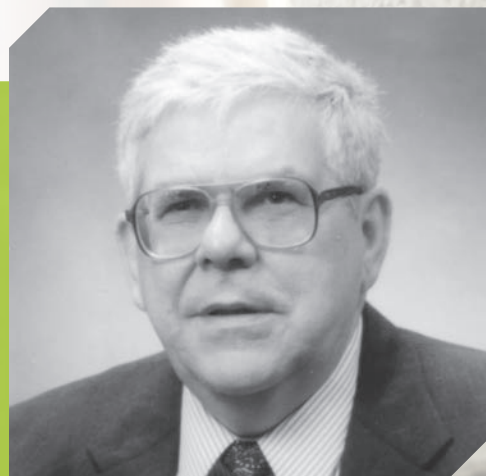
construction and modernization. Combined with community support, Hill-Burton made funding construction of the new hospital a reality.

“It’s interesting, the day we signed contracts for the building, it included money from the Hill-Burton fund which was \$4.5 million. We received a telegram from the White House. The president had decided to terminate that program for the time being because of budget problems. Well, we had just signed a contract and didn’t know what the heck to do.”

Bill and board member Robert Tilley traveled to Washington, DC to meet with Representative Henry Schadeberg and Senator William Proxmire. After several meetings, the funds were restored.

He remembers asking for confirmation in writing, just to be sure.

“We really had a big expense to get started and we did it. I worked with some wonderful people. In 50 years there have been a lot of changes.”

# PETE HALVERSON HOSPITAL BOARD PRESIDENT

1967 - 1970

Pete Halverson was on the hospital board in 1964 when the city decided it was time to transition control of the hospital to a non-profit group.

"We got a phone call on a Friday from Washington DC that LaCrosse had declined the Hill-Burton funds and we knew we were second for the money. However, the guy from Washington said, 'There's only one catch, you have to get the bid out in 9 months.' We didn't have any land, we didn't have an architect, we didn't have anything."

Faced with a very tight time frame, the group set out to find an architect to design the new hospital. After five hospital architects in Chicago turned down the job, they found Flad and Associates in Madison.

Three weeks into the design process, Halverson recalls calling the lead architect for an update on the design. They decided to meet for a drink, a meeting that would be a pivotal point in the project.

The architect was struggling with the directive he'd been given.

Pete remembers, "He reached under the booth and pulled out two big drawings of this hospital and went into great detail of how every patient would have its own window, he continued to go on and on with all the details.

I said, this is fantastic - the board members have to see it! He said, 'Well I'm probably going to get fired.' I assured him that I would call Joe Flad tomorrow morning at home, tell him what you've done and let him know that the board has to see it.

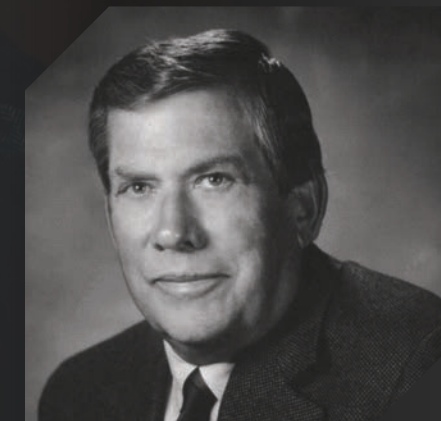
We met with the board, he put the drawings up and explained everything and the board said yes - that's what we want - it's fantastic. They later won awards with the design and people came from Atlanta and all over the country to see this building, because there's nothing like it."

"I wonder sometimes if I hadn't taken these guys for a drink and they hadn't shown me the drawings what would have happened."

The community support was incredible, raising \$3.1 million in just 90 days.

"The people in this town, they just wanted it. They must have wanted it so bad, or they wouldn't have given that money like that - that quick."

"Every time they do an addition, like the Heart Hospital, and when they did the emergency room, or when they have open houses, people flock here. They want to see it, they want to be part of it."



# I FOUND A HOME AT BELOIT CLINIC

Kenneth Gold was a young internist, just out of residency, looking for a practice. Throughout his training he had lived in New York City; Rochester, New York; Columbus, Ohio; and Key West, Florida and he was ready to put down roots. In late June 1968, he arrived in Beloit.

**“THE MOST IMPORTANT DAY OF MY LIFE WAS WHEN WE MET DR. WILLIAM FITZGERALD,** the senior doctor who had founded the Beloit Clinic in 1945 with two of his friends who he met while serving in the United States Marines. Dr. Kenneth Carter in Surgery and Dr. William Sanderson, OB all met in the South Pacific.”

Joining the Beloit Clinic and seeing patients at the new Beloit Memorial Hospital, Dr. Gold had found his home.

“The clinic and the hospital were the same, just different financial entities. It was the same staff. If you weren’t in the Beloit Clinic you wouldn’t practice at Beloit Hospital, except for those specialists that didn’t live in Beloit.”

“What I remember about the new hospital opening was that it was February of 1970. It was foggy and driving over to this area three and a half miles away, you couldn’t

see anything. There were no lights. Things weren’t paved, I was amazed. How do we move from one hospital one day and begin in the other hospital the next day?”

“It was a big improvement from the hospital on Olympian Blvd where I still go - because that is now the Olympian apartments so I make house calls once or twice a month there.”

## MEDICINE HAS CHANGED OVER THE YEARS.

“In 1968 when you came into the emergency room there was one nurse and that nurse triaged you, diagnosed and then called the doctor on-call who was at home, unless there was an obstetrician in the hospital - or the doctor said to put them in bed and I’ll see them tomorrow.”

“We’ve gone from there to what we have now, and that is an incredible difference.”

“I think the uniqueness of Beloit Health System is that it is Beloit. It is still a very localized care concern which deals with a specific locale, geographic area, and takes care of our own citizens, our neighbors.”

*“Through some of those expansions we learned new skills on how to work together to better care for the patient.”*

“I went to the 1970 hospital open house with my family. It was winter and it was cold. I remember the new maternity area because that was a really big deal to the community. Along with all the semi-private rooms, because we certainly didn’t have that before at the old hospital, there were a lot of wards. The big thing was, everyone had a window and there were only two people to a room. The community was wowed at all the new technology, the electronic tray line and how things worked.”

Mardell Jacobsen was in high school when Beloit Memorial Hospital opened its doors for the public.

She started working part-time in the kitchen as a tray girl and after graduation she would stay on to pursue her calling.

“Beloit Memorial Hospital had a school of radiography that was in the X-ray department. I actually found out about it when I was working in the kitchen. Radiography training programs everywhere at that time started in July and went for 24 months. So, I started July 1, 1971, and then I graduated 2 years later and started my new position July 1, 1973.”

Mardell took a position as an X-ray tech and advanced through the years becoming Clinical Manager in 1989 and Director of Radiology in 2001.

**ALWAYS SEARCHING FOR A SOLUTION THAT IS BEST FOR PATIENTS**, Mardell was instrumental in the creation of the new Cancer Center on Lee Lane.

“As we grew, most of our chemotherapy was done at the Beloit Clinic in a nice setting. But Dr. Vogel would see patients at the clinic, and at the time our radiation oncologist, Dr. Mahler would see patients at the hospital. We knew that some patients were treated with chemo and radiation at the same time. So, we were at a team meeting and we had heard that other places were doing a different model and we were in the planning stages of how we would replace our linear accelerator and I just said why can’t we do our own?”



“Even now the things that we are doing, we push to always be doing what is right for the patient and allowing them to stay in their community for many tests that otherwise would have had to be performed somewhere else.”

Mardell, who is retiring in 2018, says that **PATIENTS ARE AT THE HEART OF OUR SUCCESS.**

“In Beloit, we focus on what we do well and continue to do that, so patients choose us. As my techs say, ‘They know how well we cared for them, everyone can do good pictures.’ We set ourselves apart from other places by really focusing on the patient.”



# GARY ADAMSKI, MD

## PEDIATRICIAN, BELOIT HEALTH SYSTEM

1979 - 2013

“In my third year of pediatric residency, I had to start thinking about where I was going to go.”

Gary Adamski, MD grew up in Wausau, Wisconsin and attended college and medical school in Madison. He was finishing up his residency in pediatric medicine at the University of Florida in Gainesville, Florida when he saw an ad.

“At that time, they didn’t have recruiters the way they do now, so most ads were placed in medical journals. I happened to read an ad about a job listing in Beloit, Wisconsin at the Beloit Clinic. So, I answered that ad.”

“I think the whole experience impressed me so much that I really never looked for another place after that. I was so impressed that all these people would come out to show us what the area was like. I had no need to go anywhere else, I was happy right here.”

Dr. Adamski joined the Beloit Health System in 1979 and retired in 2013.

“The clinic was three years old, I believe, at the time - but it was much smaller then. It was a big square block with four floors, approximately half the size of what it is currently.”

“What I marveled at was that three physicians could get together with an idea and establish a clinic - a surgeon, an obstetrician, and an internist came together and from there a clinic, the size

of the Beloit Clinic, came about as a result of their efforts.”

“Over the course of time the clinic has evolved to one of a multi-specialty group. When I arrived in 1979 we had 29 physicians. But the last time I counted there are well over 100 physicians in the Beloit Health System now.”

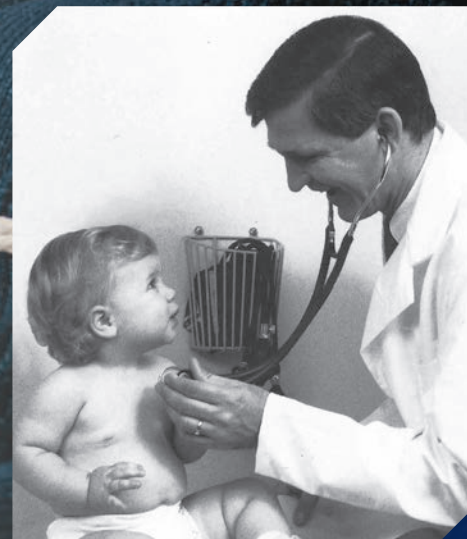

“How great is it that you can have those things locally? At the same time, we have an affiliation with the University of Wisconsin, my alma mater. Although we can enjoy the independence of being a local community hospital, we still have the backing of a major tertiary medical center, at least in certain fields. “

“I think it’s a source of pride for the whole city to have their own hospital. It’s certainly a focal point of this community.”

The importance of longevity and stability is not lost on Dr. Adamski. After practicing for more than 30 years, he’s had the privilege of caring for multiple generations.

“I think for me it is a sense of reassurance that what I did for the first generation meant something to them...enough to them that they would entrust their children to my care. I really felt good about that.”

## A COMMUNITY-BASED HEALTH SYSTEM

Arriving from Utah in 2016, Dr. Farley returned to her roots by coming back to Wisconsin.

"I had heard about a job offer in Beloit and hadn't really thought about Beloit because I'd actually never been here before my interview. But we liked that it was southern Wisconsin and close to family. I also really liked the community and the people that live in Beloit."



"I think the health system is really nice and is community-based. You don't get the same sense with an institution that is more associated with a large system. This system seems more interactive with our patients."

Dr. Farley says the ties the Health System has to the community are reflected in the care that is provided.

"Working here versus some of the other places I worked before has been very welcoming. Everyone is very easy to work with, as well as invested in making sure that we succeed and maintain staff for the long term. That's really important because you want employees who are happy and satisfied with their jobs. I feel like I've been given the tools that I need to be successful here."

### A LEGACY OF CARING

Dr. Walter Scholten and his wife Joyce moved to Beloit in 1959. Dr. Scholten was an obstetrician and gynecologist with the Beloit Clinic until his retirement in 1995. Both Dr. and Mrs. Scholten supported various healthcare organizations throughout their lives including the Beloit Memorial Hospital Auxiliary, Rock County Medical Society, and Beloit Regional Hospice. They pursued knowledge, cared for our community, and were committed to the higher education of regional students through a scholarship program.





## SPECIALIZED CARE PROVIDED LOCALLY

The first woman in Wisconsin to graduate from a surgical residency program, Susan Behrens, MD settled in Beloit in 1980.

"I had finished my fellowship and I was looking for a place to practice. I decided I wanted to be in a college town, in a clinic, and I wanted to be in a place where good medicine was being practiced. I grew up in Brodhead and I had looked in various places, but I ended up right here in my own backyard because it had everything that I was looking for."

"The hospital had already been built when I came here and it was the pride of the community. I don't know if a lot of people are aware, but when they decided to build the new hospital, the story that I was told was that they decided to build the hospital out here because it would be about halfway between the downtown areas of Beloit and Janesville."

**"IT WAS A VERY WISE MOVE TO BUILD THE HOSPITAL HERE** because they've got all this land, with a place for helicopter

landing which has become increasingly necessary these days. The business has grown out to it."

Looking back on her career in medicine, Dr. Behrens reflects on the most rewarding aspect of her time practicing medicine in Beloit. "The most rewarding thing was taking care of a problem for a patient and making it better. Patients were grateful and thankful for your efforts."

Over the years, the Health System continued to have a positive impact in the community.

"There are some things that people develop that are unusual and need more specialized care, but the majority of healthcare can be done in the local community and can be done in a hospital that's well equipped and staffed right here in Beloit. The community is fortunate to have dedicated people working hard to provide them with up-to-date care."

"I see it continuing to develop while continuing the good quality of care I realized was here when I came almost 40 years ago."

Sixteen years after retirement, Dr. Behrens welcomes a new generation of female surgeons to Beloit Health System. Dr. Behrens met with Melissa Amberger, DO a general surgeon with a specialization in breast surgery, will be joining Beloit Health System later this year. In 2017, the Association of Woman Surgeons estimated that women comprise approximately 20 percent of the surgeons in the United States.

## A COMMUNITY OF TRUST

Dr. Karne joined Beloit Health System in 2012, after finishing his general surgery residency.

"I interviewed all over the country and had the opportunity to meet with various health systems. When I came here, the administration and the physicians that I met were honestly the most trustworthy."

"I felt engaged by the administration and decided if I'm going to have my first career anywhere, Beloit was the best place."

"When a patient comes in, they are going to see people that are within the community

they can trust. When I see people who are familiar faces, it's more comfortable. I think that's the push for community health systems. I think that is why people choose to come here as opposed to driving 40-50 miles to go somewhere else."

Looking forward to the future, Dr. Karne says there is a lot on the horizon for Beloit Health System.

"Being medical staff president, I've been very lucky to find out about the renovations to the clinic that we're all excited to see. Even renovations to our hospital or operating rooms. Now that we've been able to shift some of the cases to the NorthPointe Surgery Center, it gives us the opportunity to focus on our operating rooms at the hospital."

"I've seen a lot of growth. I've seen a lot of new physicians start. We've expanded our service lines with the opening of NorthPointe Surgery Center and with the Heart Hospital. I look forward to a lot more growth in the future."

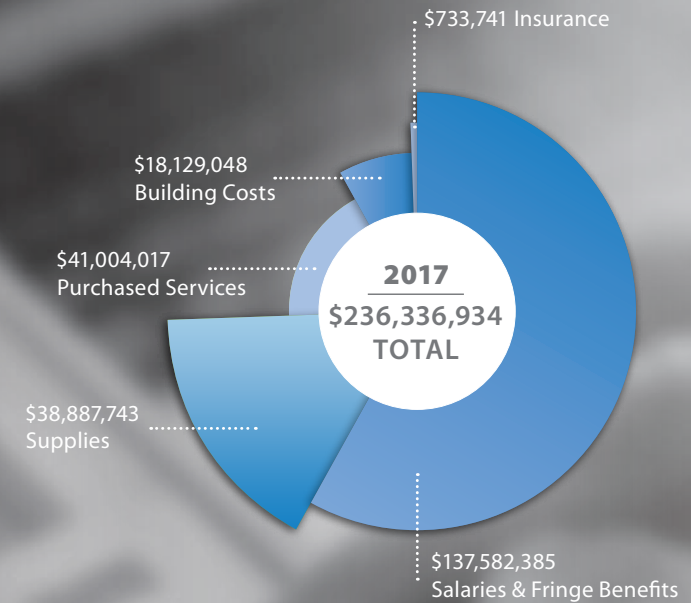

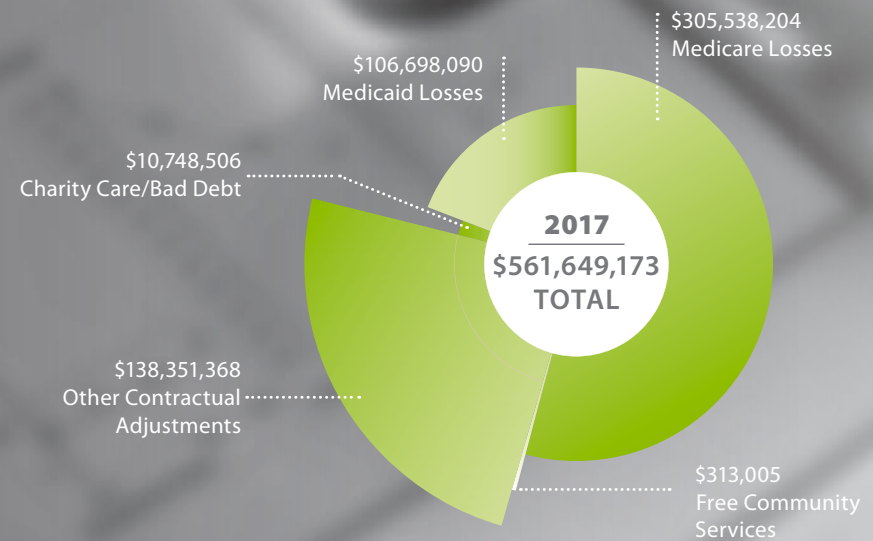
